

Broad Range of Stakeholder Interests


Statebuilding

A More Strategic Approach to Conflict Negotiation

- Think wider than the interests of the key Protagonists
- Bear in mind the importance of State-Building for long-term sustainability



Broad & Well-Coordinated International Strategy

- International Coordination should be a broad church



Develop Better Instruments
